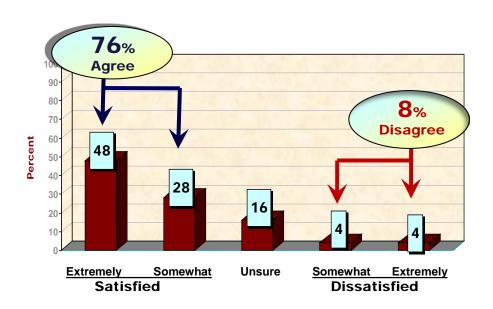


Figure 9 City of Eugene Library April 2015

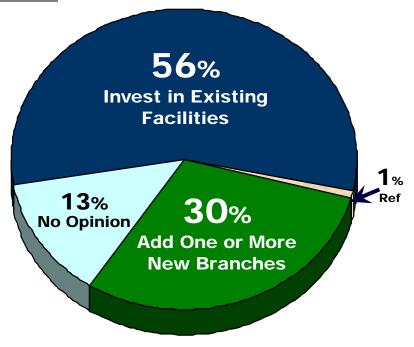

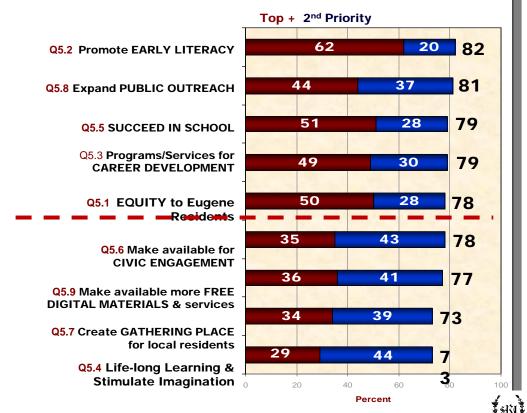
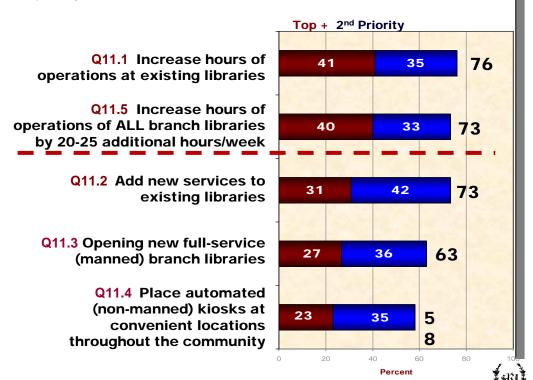


Figure 7 City of Eugene Library April 2015

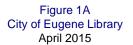

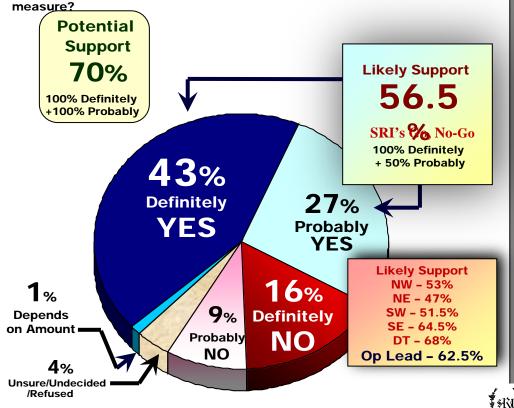


Figure 1B City of Eugene Library April 2015

Question 6.2: More specifically, would you be willing to pay \$5/month to make this possible, which equates to \$60/year?

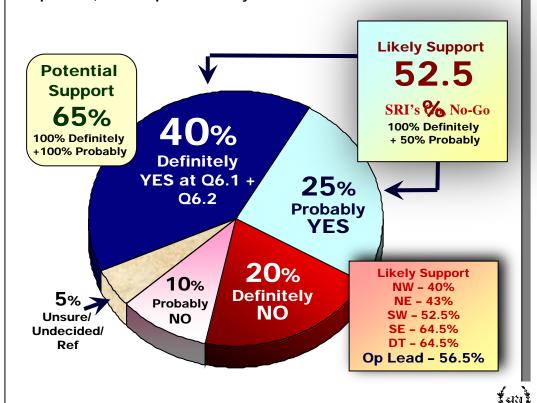


Figure 1C City of Eugene Library April 2015

Question 6.3: Would you support such a Measure if the amount of increase were to be kept to \$4/month, which equates to \$48/year?

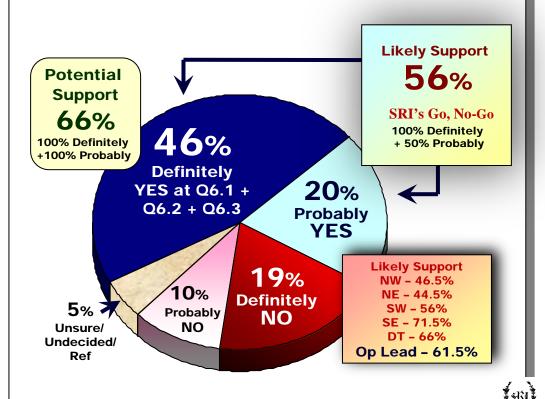


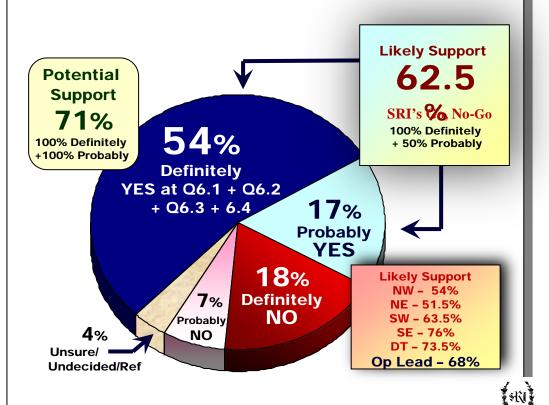
Figure 1D City of Eugene Library April 2015

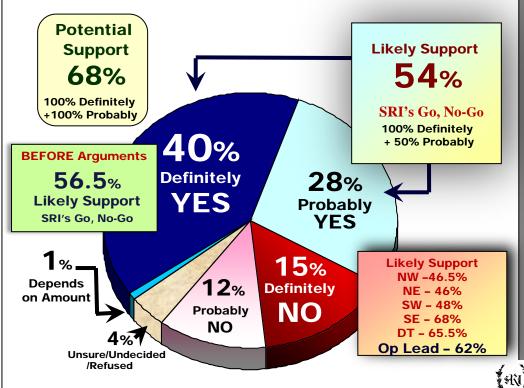

Positive Net Shift Due to Arguments Tested

Arguments FOR Proposed Measure

Net Shift

Q7.5 With additional funding, the library will be able to purchase additional books and materials, as well as access to a wider range of resources...and, +3.2% there will be shorter "wait time" for best sellers and new movies.

- Q7.7 The funding will be used to RESTORE library services to previous levels, before all the budget cuts. +2.3%

 Q7.3 The money from this levy, if authorized by Eugene voters, will be used to purchase additional TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT that could be shared by community members who might not be able to afford such items. This is sometimes called Makerspace. This would give people access to software, special hi-tech printers, media equipment, plus more. As a result, those who are interested in learning about technologies for personal use OR to advance their careers, including how to use them, will be able to do this. They will also have the opportunity to collaborate with others at the library.

 Q7.10 Bonds approved by Eugene voters in the 1990's will be RETIRED soon, which will reduce local property taxes, thus, offsetting the increase you would pay by approving the library levy.
 - Q7.9 The Eugene community has supported library levies three times in the past, so this is a <u>tried-and-true</u> way for City officials +1.9% to make improvements to these important services.

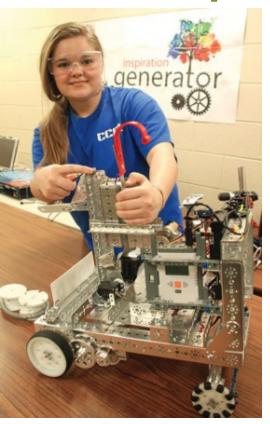

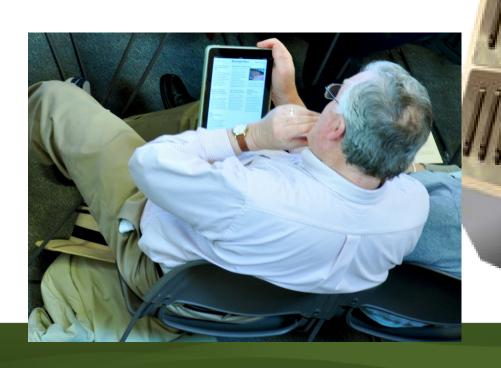

Increasing access at Bethel & Sheldon Branches.



Levy Option 1

- Hours added to all locations:
 Bethel & Sheldon: Add 22 hours, for 48 hours across 6 days
 Downtown: Add 3 hours on Sunday morning, for 64 hours
- Materials budget increased
- Off site programs (Early literacy and Makerspace)
- Additional workshops and events for all ages
- Increased access to technology

Total: \$2.5 to \$2.7 million a year - \$33 to \$37 per year for a typical household (approx. \$3/month)



Levy Option 2 Approximately \$4/month



Additional Hours added

Bethel & Sheldon Branches: add another 4 hours on Sundays to be open 52 hours across 7 days branch book returns open 24/7

Downtown:
Add 5 more hours

Off-site programs bring Library experts to the community

- Early literacy services to young kids

Levy Option 2

- Hours added to all locations:
 Bethel & Sheldon: Add 26 hours, for 52 hours across 7 days
 Downtown: Add 8 hours, for 69 hours across 7 days
- Expanded off-site programs (Early literacy and Makerspace)
- Increased access to technology.

Total: \$3.5 to \$3.7 million a year - \$45 to \$49 per year for a typical household (approx. \$4/month)
