1 What do you see as the role of a Human Rights Commissioner?

A Human Rights Commissioner exists to represent the diverse needs of those who reside within his or her community. The Commissioner is an ally and an advocate who sees both the big picture and specific instances where he or she can be most successful in enhancing the community's understanding of and engagement with all who work, live and play here. Additionally, the Commissioner must be willing to engage in difficult conversations related to controversial issues, including, but not limited to, race, gender, ethnicity, hegemony, dominance, subordination, education, training, access, transportation, economy and cultural competence.

2 What three major issues do you identify as facing the community of Eugene over the next 20 years?

First, Eugene must continue to better enhance its relationships with underrepresented communities, including, but not limited to, diverse ethnicities and non-English speaking populations. Second, the city must be willing to acknowledge its weaknesses in serving its citizens over time and openly work with its population to collaboratively open better lines of communication. Third, Eugene must pay careful attention to the distinctions in socioeconomic standing that exist geographically, in our schools and throughout our neighborhoods, as well as examine how these intersect with race and ethnicity.

My primary objective in group discussions is to listen and hear first, then to act, react or to speak. I believe I can only provide my best commentary and perspective after properly understanding what those around me have to share, and as a representative of the community, it would be my role to listen and hear those I am in place to serve before acting or reacting on their behalf. Diverse groups are often willing to have difficult conversations that must take place, and I am thoroughly appreciative of these challenging conversations because I believe they often bring the most beneficial results. A weakness I possess is that I can become frustrated when unwillingness to take action or collaborate dominates a conversation, and the conversation's objective/goal is thus sidetracked by the diverse group rather than acted upon.
